As we celebrate the first full year of our Intensive Support Service, built following the $\pounds 3$ million Capital Appeal, I look back at was has been achieved over the year.

Firstly, we have five young people staying in the two new residential houses and they are thriving on achieving their own personal outcomes.

It was a lot to ask of the young people to come into a new environment, be looked after by a new team of support workers and build relationships and share spaces with new young people. However, they have adapted incredibly well and are making East Park their home.

The personal achievements of the young people vary from individual, some small and some huge but equally important and these are celebrated with our young people.

We have a young person within the service who struggled to attend school, before coming to East Park she had not been in education for almost a year. Since coming to the intensive support service and through consistent joint working with our education department she is now in full time education and thriving, working on alternative communication techniques, building up experiences in the community and making positive contributions to her school and house environment.

Through consistent and committed joint working one of our young men is building positive relationships in education, accessing the community and utilising outdoor learning experiences.

As with all our services supporting the young people to reach their maximum potential is our priority however this cannot be done without a committed and enthusiastic staff team. Opening a new service and bringing new staff from all walks of life together can be a challenge. However, this team has wholeheartedly embraced the challenge, thinking outside the box and have put into practice the social pedagogical method of building strong individual relationships and finding a common bond between each one of them and the individual young people. This has had a significant and positive impact on the young people's experiences, relationships and working together to improve their skills.

It is with this attitude that the team was awarded *Highly Commended Top Team* at the Scottish Institute for Residential Child Care Awards 2017. As the manager of this service, I nominated the team for this award to recognise their hard work, the challenge of the past year and their unfaltering commitment to improving the lives of our young people.

It goes without saying that the team did not work alone, we work jointly with our colleagues in the school to ensure our children are provided with the consistency in all aspects of their lives and we embrace the approach that every environment and activity is a learning opportunity. issue..

JOHN'S FIRST BUS EXPERIENCE

During the month of July, resident John visited Caledonia bus depot for a guided tour of First Bus. John is a big fan of buses, and would love to drive them when he is older, so he was very excited to go along.

On arrival, John met up with George McLeod who very kindly arranged the tour especially for John. John was taken around First Buses head office, accessing all areas including the training department and gym. In training, John was taken through DVDs of local bus routes, which are used to train new drivers, and he was able to select his preferred route to take home with him, this of course made John even more excited about the prospect of driving buses one day.

Next stop on the tour was the work shop, George showed John all the buses that were in for repair and introduced him to some of the mechanics. The team made John a personalised First Bus number plate with his name on, which John was ecstatic about. For John though, it was the final stop on the tour that he enjoyed the most. John accessed a number of buses, was taught how to start the engine, work the doors, wipers, indicators and beep the horn. Developing Communication

East Park has gratefully received financial support from a number of supporters to train its staff in the use of Makaton. Makaton is a language programme using signs and symbols to help people to communicate. Staff will be trained in the use of Makaton, enhancing their communication skills with the children and young people, as well as providing them with the knowledge and skills to share and train fellow staff members in using Makaton within East Park.

Our staff will undertake a 3 stage training course, firstly learning the language themselves and embedding what they've learned into their work with the children and young people and utilising their new skills with confidence. Secondly, staff will learn to how to train their colleagues at East Park in the use of Makaton. They will be able to use real life examples and challenges encountered every day in their work and with their new training skills transfer their knowledge and understanding to their colleagues.

Two staff members will attend an enhanced course, providing them with the skills to become Regional Trainers where they will be able to train parents and families of the young people, as well as other professionals.

This project will equip our staff, young people and families with vital communication skills that will help our young people reach their full potential.
