Being mindful of this Lisa and Emma gave Nadia continuous reassurance, and step-bystep instructions of what was happening throughout her journey.

On arrival, a very excited Nadia met security who she handed her tickets to and was shown to her seat. The lights went down and Little Mix appeared on stage, greeted by roars from the crowd and Nadia shouting "Hello" and clapping. She enjoyed singing and dancing the night away!
