### Looking Forward Gerry Wells Chairman of East Park

Having served as Vice-Chair, I was delighted in October 2018 to be appointed Chair of East Park Board. I feel honoured to be in this position and I look forward to assisting the organisation to achieve future success.

After a career in social work and having lived and worked in and around Glasgow for more than 40 years, I am very aware of the huge part East Park plays both within the local community and within Glasgow City. It has a long history, evolving over the years as it continues with a mission set out almost 145 years ago. It has developed into a national resource.

East Park is a remarkable charitable organisation which meets the educational and developmental needs of unique young people in ways many local authorities are unable to. But East Park is not just filling a gap, it provides fully immersive care and support that ensures the best opportunities for children and young people who live with challenges that many, other than their parents and families, can have little appreciation of.

Delivering these services involves three key partners – young individuals, families and East Park staff. The Board of Trustees takes a keen interest in hearing how these partners

interact and what is needed to help ensure progress for all of them. We know environment and resources are crucial and we strive to ensure we do the best we can. The developments of our intensive support residences and the individual classrooms are examples of major longterm investments, but small everyday things can make all the difference too. Trustees also seek assurances on staff training, development and welfare. Skilled, confident and valued staff will ensure young people and their families feel appropriately engaged and supported.

As I have spent time in East Park, I have been consistently impressed with the skill and sensitivity of staff as they engage with the children and young people. I have enjoyed attending prize-givings and Christmas celebration events, and have been moved by the talents and skills individual young people can develop through the specialist support East Park provides. I now very much look forward to ensuring the skills evident on the Board of Trustees are used to the best advantage of East Park, to working closely with the Executive Director and the Senior Management Team, and to getting to know more staff members at Board meetings.
