Dramatic success -Alisha's Surprise

Our young people and colleagues have developed, written and performed a play about what it's like to be a disabled child in care – an amazing piece of work.

The play is called Alisha's Surprise and tells the story of Alisha's birthday party. It's a poignant exploration of the effect that being a child in care has on the event.

The play was performed as part of the "Being Heard: Listening to and Learning from Looked-after Disabled Children and Young People in Residential Care" project. For 140 years we have been providing Education and Supported Accommodation to children and young people with additional support needs in Glasgow and throughout Scotland.

East Park first opened its doors during the reign of Queen Victoria in a direct response to the Education (Scotland) Act of 1872.

Although unrecognisable from those early days in the cottage on Maryhill Road, the philosophy at the heart of our work remains unaltered.

East Park has gone from strength to strength during its 140 years history. Our success lies in our ability to continue to recognise and to respond to changing societal needs, evolving education and social care policy and legislation and having the ability to develop our services to meet those needs. 140 years on, our philosophy reflects current legislation, best practice, and a commitment to excellence in the services that we provide for our children and young people from across Scotland.

East Park successfully bid for funding from the Better Breaks Fund in April.

The Better Breaks Fund is set up by the Scottish Government with the aim of improving the range and reach of short breaks for disabled children and their families, especially for children with multiple support needs. The Minister for Public Health, Michael Matheson said, "Families caring for a disabled child or young person should have the same choices and opportunities as others".

Better Breaks can be immensely important for children, young people, and their parents or carers as they provide many with the opportunity to experience something new, learn new skills and make new friends.
